# STATE OF OHIO AIP PERFORMANCE REPORT APRIL - JUNE, 1996

## SUMMARY

1. During the quarter, Ohio EPA (OEPA), Ohio Department of Health (ODH) and Ohio Emergency Management Agency (OEMA) continued to work with the Department of Energy (DOE), contractors, and the public on the AIP program at Ohio sites (Fernald, Mound and Portsmouth). Emergency management activities continue at all three sites including training, planning, communication, hazard assessments, and exercises. Environmental monitoring continues at all sites including additional air monitoring activities at Mound and Fernald. The field sampling plan for Mound was submitted and is under
2. The Financial Status Reports for the three sites are attached. Ohio is currently working under a three month no cost extension through September 30th with an expectation that the AIP will then be awarded for a nine-month period.
3. Ohio completed and distributed an annual report to the public on the Fernald site detailing AIP as well as other activities.
4. Discussions regarding the scope of the AIP for the Portsmouth site are continuing. A revised work plan is being prepared for distribution in July.
5. Another issue under discussion is the emergency planning involvement under the AIP for offsite transportation issues at all three sites.

## Administration

1. Regular AIP coordination meetings/conference calls occurred at the dates and locations listed below with OEPA, ODH, OEMA, DOE sites (Fernald, Portsmouth, Mound) and the Ohio Field Office.

2. Additional phone calls/meetings occurred between the Ohio agencies to coordinate AIP activities.
3. A DOE auditor visited Ohio in May to audit the Fernald and Mound AIP programs.

### Environmental Monitoring

#### Scope of Work/Objectives

1. Evaluate and oversee DOE environmental monitoring programs at Fernald, Mound and Portsmouth sites. Provide comments to DOE.
2. Establish and conduct an Ohio Environmental Monitoring Program at these sites that include split sampling and independent sampling of environmental media.
3. Communicate results to the public and other stakeholders.

### Accomplishments

1. Split sampling activities continue at the Fernald, Mound and Portsmouth sites. Results from these samples are shared with the public each quarter.
2. Air monitoring activities increased at the Mound and Fernald sites. A background location for both sites (Eaton WWTP) was established and began operation in May. Additional particulate air samples were established at Mound and Fernald. Radon samples have also been established at Fernald and the tritium monitors at Mound. An effort has been made to establish sites that will be able to monitor potential emissions from remedial activities - Fernald and Mound's current mission.
3. Ohio's field sampling plan for the Mound site was completed in April and distributed for internal review. After internal revisions the plan was submitted to DOE in June for review and comment.
4. Data from samples collected at a residents request was analyzed and prepared for presentation (Mound site).

### Public Involvement/Education

#### Scope of Work/Objectives

1. Involve the public in all aspects of the AIP program.
2. Share environmental monitoring data, reports and conclusions with the public.
3. Address questions raised by the public.

### Accomplishments

1. In May the first Fernald Annual Report to the Public on Fernald was completed and mailed out to the public and other stakeholders. This report covers AIP activities during calendar year 1995 as well as other activities related to site cleanup. Ohio has received positive feedback about the report from stakeholders.

2. Ohio continues to update our home page on the World Wide Web. This home page provides information to the public on Ohio's and DOE's environmental monitoring activities and on overall cleanup effort. Stakeholders viewing the home page have the ability to send Ohio staff e-mail asking questions and requesting additional information. The home page is also linked to the DOE headquarters and DOE FUSRAP home pages. Recently, Ohio established a link with the new DOE Fernald home page. As Ohio sites establish their home pages we will link with them. The home page address is <http://offo2.epa.ohio.gov/offo.htm>.
3. Quarterly monitoring data is presented to Fernald local citizens at FRESH meetings.
4. Numerous phone calls and discussions with concerned citizens at all three Ohio sites.

### **Environmental Data Management**

#### Scope of Work/Objectives

1. Manage and evaluate large volumes of environmental monitoring data and put in a form understandable to the public utilizing Geographic Information System (GIS) and Geographic Positioning System (GPS) tools.

#### **Accomplishments**

1. Ohio continues to use the GIS and GPS to manage AIP data, produce maps and inform the public about environmental monitoring efforts for the Mound and Fernald sites. This system has been very valuable in the preparation of the Fernald Annual Report (to include AIP and cost recovery activities) that will be completed next quarter.
2. A paper written by Kelly Kaletsky, Randy Earle and Tom Schneider dealing with Ohio's use of the GIS and GPS systems at DOE sites was accepted at Eco Informa and will be presented in Orlando in November.
3. Implementation of the GIS continues to progress at the Mound site. Ohio appreciated being invited to participate in some GIS training activities with Mound staff.

### **Review of DOE Programmatic Issues**

#### Scope of Work/Objectives

1. Review of DOE programmatic issues, documents, and be involved in the national dialogue that impacts Ohio sites. Issues included in this review are DOE budgets, PEIS documentation, national waste management plans, technology development issues, reconfiguration plans, etc.

#### **Accomplishments**

1. The major activity during this quarter was the effort to review and be involved in the DOE FY 1998 budget process. Ohio staff participated in risk training which was part of the prioritization efforts and in actual risk evaluation sessions. In May Ohio staff were invited to join DOE staff to participate in the finalization of the budget for the Ohio Field Office (IRB process).

2. In June a conference call was held to discuss DOE's FFY 1997 and 1998 budget status and issues.
3. Also in June a NGA sponsored conference call was held with Al Alm. Mr. Alm discussed his new "10 year plan" for the Environmental Management program.
4. A conference call was held in June with members of the State and Tribal Government Working Group to discuss budget problems and the group's future.
5. Al Alm hosted a national stakeholders video conference in late June.
6. Ohio reviewed and provided comments on some of the data problems (inventory inaccuracies) occurring in the national dialogue on waste, nuclear materials, etc.

### Emergency Management

#### Scope of Work/Objectives

1. To ensure that past and present activities at the Fernald Environmental Management Project (FEMP), the Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant (PORTS), and the Mound Laboratories (MOUND) pose minimal risk to the citizens and environment of Ohio. This will be accomplished by:

1. Revising and maintaining the State Hazmat Plan with USDOE facilities Annex;
2. Conducting joint training with USDOE and county responders;
3. Conducting periodic drills and exercises with USDOE and county responders;
4. Monitoring and improving the communications and warning systems between the State, counties, and USDOE facilities;
5. Improving Ohio's Emergency Operations Center to better deal with and mitigate events at USDOE facilities; and
6. Conduct joint public information operations with the USDOE facilities.

### Accomplishments

#### **Planning**

1. OEMA continued to make revisions to **the State of Ohio Hazardous Materials Emergency Management Plan with USDOE Annex**. Revisions which include an updated independent hazards analysis for FEMP, PORTS, and MOUND, are currently being reviewed by the Ohio State Emergency Response Commission (SERC). The SERC has decided that revisions should not be published until the fall or winter of 1996 (AIP Year #3).
2. OEMA personnel assisted with the incorporation of USDOE hazards analysis information into the state's comprehensive Risk Assessment. The state's Risk Assessment is being developed by OEMA.

3. OEMA continues to assist with the incorporation of USDOE information into the state-wide Resource Directory. USDOE information used in the directory will include USDOE contact information and equipment/personnel resources from USDOE that may be available during disasters.
4. Ohio and Miami Valley EMA and OEPA personnel attended a briefing on the MOUND Hazards Assessment (draft version). The briefing was presented by the contractor that performed the assessment. During the briefing the contractor explained the methodology used to screen-out certain hazardous substances, determine toxicity levels and levels of concern, and establish emergency planning zones. The contractor also explained how certain scenarios were used to postulate worst-case accident impacts.
5. OEMA began the process of entering USDOE site information into the new CAMEO-Win (Computer Aided Management of Emergency Operations for Windows) program. The CAMEO-Win program allows the state Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to organize site information by chemical inventory, hazards analysis information, transportation routes, and special populations. The CAMEO-Win program will be used during exercises and actual emergencies to assist the state with incident assessment and protective action recommendations.
6. OEMA continued its evaluation of the Mound Hazards Assessment. The Mound Hazards Assessment is a voluminous document that will take several months to completely evaluate. OEMA also performed preliminary reviews of the FEMP and PORTS Hazards Assessment.
7. Butler County EMA conducted separate planning meetings with FERMCO, the Fire Chief Association, Morgan Township Trustee/Fire Chief, and the Hazmat Response Cooperative to discuss possible dates and scenarios for an exercise at the FEMP.
8. Hamilton County EMA continued its coordination with response departments identified in the response plan and plan revisions. Hamilton County EMA also continued the computerization of FEMP's chemical inventory and hazards analysis and database updates.
9. Miami Valley EMA continued review of the Mound Hazards Analysis, and the development of an independent offsite hazards analysis.

### **Training**

1. OEMA sent one person to the CAMEO-Win Train-The-Trainer workshop. OEMA will be offering to train state, AIP-County, USDOE contractor, and USDOE personnel in the use of the CAMEO-Win program as an emergency management tool. The 5 day workshop was conducted at the Michigan Hazardous Materials Training Center. The workshop was instructed by USEPA and NOAA personnel.
2. OEMA personnel attended training on the PORTS Emergency Plan. The training was conducted at the Pike County ECO by personnel from the PORTS facility.
3. Butler County EMA participated with representatives from FERMCO, the Hazmat Response Cooperative, and the Sheriff's Office in functional and tabletop exercises. The exercises concentrated on notification and communications.
4. Hamilton County EMA participated in a fullscale exercise with Green Township and FEMP. Hamilton County EMA also participated in a tabletop exercise with FEMP that concentrated on notification and communications procedures.
5. OEMA, Butler County EMA and Hamilton County EMA personnel attended the FEMP Community Planning and Training meeting in Ross Township.

### **Communication and Warning**

1. OEMA personnel participated in the periodic testing of the ringdown phone from FEMP.
2. Butler County EMA participated in the periodic testing of the ringdown phone from FEMP. Butler County EMA also tested all other devices used to communicate with the FEMP.
3. OEMA, Butler County EMA, and Hamilton County EMA monitored the monthly testing of the FEMP outdoor warning system. No malfunctions were reported during this quarter.
4. Hamilton County EMA participated in the periodic testing of the FEMP ringdown phone. Hamilton County EMA also tested all other devices used to communicate with the FEMP.

### **Administration**

1. OEMA personnel received USDOE-Ohio Field Office clearance badges. The new badges replace the clearance badges issued by the USDOE-Albuquerque Office.

### **Public Information/Public Relations**

1. OEMA participated in the Environmental Fair at Shawnee State University. OEMA's display was titled "Accidents Can Happen". The display included demonstrations of how emergency management and emergency response software, such as CAMEO-Win, can be used to assist the state and local responders in estimating the impact of accidents at USDOE facilities.

**Significant Changes from Intended Activities**

1. OEMA intended to publish versions to the State of Ohio Hazardous Materials Emergency Management Plan with USDOE Annex during the 4th quarter. This publication has been delayed while the State Emergency Response Commission (SERC) reviews the plan and proposed revisions. The revisions will be published during the next AIP year.
2. OEMA financial data will be included in the next quarterly performance report.

**OHIO AIP PROGRAM**

**Significant Issues**

1. Ohio is evaluating several sources of funding for offsite transportation planning and training. OEMA feels that if state, county, or local agencies are restricted, under the AIP, to participating in onsite scenarios only, then the sites should be required to develop onsite scenarios. If the sites employ offsite scenarios that require offsite agencies to participate, the sites should negotiate reimbursement for such participation with the county EMA office. We are continuing to discuss these issues with DOE and Ohio Field Office staff. Ohio continues to believe that having state and local involvement in offsite transportation issues is critical to DOE achieving their long term goals of waste and material shipments.
2. Several meetings occurred to reach resolution on the scope of the AIP at Portsmouth site. A meeting occurred on April 23 with DOE and Ohio (ODH, OEMA and OEPA) staff to discuss options for the Portsmouth AIP. It was agreed that Ohio would wait until the Portsmouth Annual Environmental Report was released and then work on a revised workplan. This revised workplan describing a significant reduction in activities from the original workplan, is in preparation and will be distributed for review in July.
